Gaia Balp



Gaia Balp is an Assistant Professor of Business Law at Bocconi University Milan, Italy.

Her scholarship mainly focuses on corporate law and securities regulation and comprises articles published or to be published in the *European Company and Financial Law Review*, *The University of Illinois Journal of Law Technology & Policy*, and Italian leading law journals (e.g. *Analisi Giuridica dell'Economia*, *Banca Borsa e Titoli di Credito*, *Rivista di Diritto Civile*, *Rivista delle Società*). She has also authored a book on Proxy Advisors. Some representative projects include retail investor engagement in the US and the EU, high-frequency trading in equity markets, and early warning tools in preventive restructuring frameworks. Professor Balp is a member of the Faculty of the Ph.D. in Legal Studies at Bocconi University.

Hanne Birkmose



Hanne S. Birkmose is a professor at the Department of Law, Aarhus University, Denmark. Her research areas include Company Law – in particular International Company Law and EU Company Law – and Corporate Governance, and she has written several national and international articles within these areas. In addition, she is the editor of several international volumes on company law topics. She is also the author of Danish books on UCITS and Alternative Investment Funds. Recently, she has mainly worked with shareholder activism and the role of institutional shareholders. In 2014, she received a research grant from the Danish Independent Research Council for a project on 'Shareholders' Duties'. Hanne S. Birkmose is an academic member of the ECGI, a member of the ELI, the Nordic Company Law Network and the Nordic Corporate Governance Network.

Christoph Van der Elst



Christoph Van der Elst is professor of Business Law and Economics at Tilburg University (The Netherlands) and at Ghent University (Belgium). He is a member of the Belgian Bar and advised many different government agencies at national and international level. He is also a member of the audit committee of the Ghent University Hospital and an independent director of Aphilion. His current research interests are corporate governance, (economic analysis of) company law and in particular shareholder rights and voting and the effects of distributed ledger technology, all topics in which he published widely in academic and professional journals. He holds a PhD. in Economics, a master in Law and a master in Economics.

Rigas Giovannopoulos

Rigas Giovannopoulos is an asst. professor of law at the Department of Commercial and Financial Law, Law School, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, Greece. He is a graduate with distinction of the Law School of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (1994) and possesses a summa cum laude postgraduate degree (Magister Legum Europae) of the University of Hannover/Germany (1996) and a summa cum laude PhD degree of the University of Frankfurt am Main/Germany (2000). He was awarded the “Baker & McKenzie Prize” in 2000 for his thesis on bank secrecy.

Asst. Prof. Giovannopoulos has been teaching for many years company law and has been a member of the Greek Corporate Law Amendment of 2007 (Law 3604/2007). He is an author of the leading book on voidable GM resolutions and of many articles and annotations on company law. Asst. Prof. Giovannopoulos is a qualified lawyer and an accredited mediator.

Suren Gomtsyan

Professor Suren Gomtsyan is an associate professor at University of Leeds. He joined the School of Law in October 2016. He holds a PhD in law (2016) and an LLM Research Master in Law (2012, cum laude) from Tilburg University, the Netherlands. Prior to this, Professor Gomtsyan worked in legal practice with focus on corporate law matters and M&A transactions. I was also a visiting research fellow at Fordham University School of Law, New York, in 2014.

Professor Gomtsyan received several prizes and grants, including the "Research Talent" Grant of the Netherlands Organization for Scientific Research (2013-2016), "Brenno Galli" Award for the most promising young scholar's paper at the annual conference of the Italian Society of Law and Economics (2016), Prize for the best paper of a young scholar at the annual conference of the Spanish Association of Law and Economics (2015), and Young Scholar's Prize at the International Law and Economics Conference at Bilkent University (2015).

His recent paper on shareholder engagement by large institutional investors was short-listed for the Society of Legal Scholars' 2018 Best Paper Prize.

Professor Gomtsyan's research, which focuses on corporate law and private ordering, has been published or is forthcoming in various journals, including the Journal of Corporation Law, the Yale Journal of International Law, the American Business Law Journal, the Delaware Journal of Corporate Law, and the Villanova Law Review, and has also been cited in the Financial Times, by the United States Court of Appeals (4th Circuit), and by the Delaware Court of Chancery.

Gen Goto

Gen Goto is Professor of Law at the University of Tokyo, Graduate Schools for Law and Politics, in Japan. He has visited Harvard Law School as Visiting Scholar at East Asian Legal Studies (2013-2015, 2018), and has taught at National University of Singapore, Faculty of Law (2017, 2019) and at Radzyner Law School of IDC Herzliya in Israel (2019). After graduating from Faculty of Law at the University of Tokyo in 2003 (LL.B.), Professor Goto had been Assistant Professor at the University of Tokyo (2003-2006), Lecturer (2006-2008) and Associate Professor (2008-2010) at Gakushuin University in Tokyo, and Associate Professor (2010-2019) at the University of Tokyo. Also, he had assisted the Japanese Government on law reforms as Researcher of Japanese Ministry of Justice (2010-2013, for reform of Companies Act) and as Professional Member of Financial System Council of Japanese Financial Services Agency (2011-2013 and 2016-present, for reform of Insurance Business Act and other financial regulations). Ankita's research interests include corporate governance, corporate law, securities regulation, and multinational corporate accountability. Anil is an Associate Professor in the School of Taxation and Business Law at UNSW Business School, Sydney, Australia.

Anil has published over 100 articles and conference papers in the area of corporate and insolvency law. His scholarly work has been cited by the Corporations and Markets Advisory Committee (CAMAC) in Australia and the judiciary.

Anil is the past President of the Corporate Law Teachers Association of Australia (2011–2013), a peak body representing scholars in the Asia-Pacific region. He is a member of the Applied Corporate Law and Corporate Governance Subject Advisory Committee for the Governance Institute of Australia.

Anil is the co-editor of the Insolvency Law Bulletin.

Anil has authored and co-authored several books including Principles of Contemporary Corporate Governance (4th ed, Cambridge University Press, 2018) and Australian Corporate Law (6th ed, LexisNexis, 2018).

Harpreet Kaur

Dr. Harpreet Kaur joined National Law University, Delhi in 2011. She is currently Professor of Law at NLU Delhi, as well as the faculty-in-charge for certificate and diploma courses on Competition Policy and Law. She is a Fulbright Scholar in Residence and has served as Chair Professor of Indian Studies at Leibniz University, Hannover, Germany for a semester. She has taught Company Law, Corporate Law, Competition Law, Law of Insurance and International Business Law at NLU Delhi. She was selected for the International Visitor Leadership Programme on Competition Law sponsored by US State Government and visited USA for three weeks exchange programme in 2015.

She has previously been Professor and Dean at the Institute for Integrated Learning in Management – Graduate School of Management, Greater Noida. She has developed and taught interdisciplinary courses on law for managers from different streams of management education, including international business laws and the legal aspects of retail and banking businesses.

She has been a PhD guide at NLU Delhi, MATS University Raipur and Singhanian University, as well as an external moderator for Business Law courses. She also has vast experience as a resource person for management and faculty development programs in company and competition law, and contract management and international contracts. She has presented papers and chaired sessions at various seminars and national and international conferences.

Her areas of interest include Company Law, Securities Regulations, Business Law, Investments Law, Competition Law and Consumer Protection.

Vikramaditya Khanna

Vikramaditya S. Khanna, The William W. Cook Professor of Law, is Faculty Co-Director of the Joint Centre for Global Corporate and Financial Law and Policy, a collaboration between Michigan Law and India's Jindal Global Law School.

He earned his SJD at Harvard Law School and was the Bruce W. Nichols Visiting Professor of Law in fall 2013 at Harvard Law School. He also was a senior research fellow at Columbia Law School and Yale Law School, and a visiting scholar at Stanford Law School. His interest areas include corporate and securities laws, law and legal issues in India, corporate and white collar crime, legal profession and professional responsibility, corporate governance in emerging markets, and law and economics.

He is the founding and current editor of White Collar Crime eJournal and India Law eJournal at the Social Science Research Network and has served as special master in a dispute involving an Indian and American company. He has testified before the U.S. Congress and his papers have been published in the Harvard Law Review, Journal of Finance, Journal of Econometrics, Michigan Law Review, Supreme Court Economic Review, Journal of Law, Economics and Organization, American Journal of Comparative Law, and Georgetown Law Journal, among others. News publications in the United States, India, Germany, Switzerland, Brazil, and the United Kingdom have quoted him.

He has given talks at Harvard, Columbia, Stanford, Yale, and New York universities; the University of California, Berkeley; the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania; the National Bureau of Economic Research; and other venues in the United States, India, China, Turkey, and Greece, among others, including keynotes in the United States, Brazil, and India.

Berte- Elan R Konow

Professor dr. juris from the Faculty of Law, University of Bergen, Norway. Her authorship covers a wide range of commercial law issues such as contract law, law of obligations and mortgage law/law of secured transactions as well as comparative law and private international law. In 2013-2017 she served as Vice Dean at the Law Faculty.

Konow was member of the working group preparing the European Principles of Lease of Movables (DCFR Book IV B). She was member of Editorial Board of Restatement of Nordic Contract Law, and she is currently member of the editorial board of *Insolvensrättslig Tidskrift* (Nordic Journal of Insolvency Law).

Anne Lafarre

Dr. Anne Lafarre Msc is assistant professor at the Business Law Department at Tilburg University. She also teaches at the Jheronimus Academy of Data Science in 's-Hertogenbosch and is the academic director of a Joint Data Science bachelor's program in Tilburg together with the Eindhoven University of Technology. She holds a cum laude master's degree in economics and in law. Her Ph.D. in 2017 at Tilburg University, which was awarded cum laude, concerned comparative-legal and econometric analyses of shareholder (voting) behavior in the Annual General Meeting of shareholders (AGM). As a result of her multidisciplinary background, her research sits at the heart of the law and economics research area. She works mainly in the field of corporate governance.

Yu-Hsin Lin

Dr. Lin's research interests focus on empirical and economic analysis of corporate law and capital markets regulation. She engages widely on cutting-edge corporate governance issues in controlled firms and state-owned enterprises, including dual-class shares, political compliance, shareholder activism, anti-takeovers, board independence and securities class action. She speaks regularly at international academic conferences and has been the referee at leading law and finance journals. Dr. Lin holds a J.S.D. degree from Stanford Law School, where she was appointed as the John M. Olin Fellow in Law and Economics. She had also been a visiting professor at Radzyner Law School, IDC Herzliya, Israel and visiting scholar at Harvard Law School. She has published with leading academic journals and has also been interviewed by major media, including The Economist and Bloomberg, as a corporate law expert.

Florian Möslein

Florian Möslein is Director of the Institute for Law and Regulation of Digitalisation (www.irdi.institute) and Professor of Law at the Philipps-University Marburg, where he teaches Contract Law, Company Law and Capital Markets Law. He previously held academic positions at the Universities of Bremen, St. Gallen, and Berlin, and visiting fellowships in Italy (Florence, European University Institute), the US (NYU, Stanford and Berkeley) and Australia (Universities of Sydney and Melbourne).

Having graduated from the Faculty of Law in Munich, he also holds academic degrees from the University of Paris-Assas (licence en droit) and London (LL.M. in International Business Law). Florian Möslein published three monographs and over 80 articles and book contributions, and has edited seven books.

His current research focus is on regulatory theory, corporate sustainability and the legal challenges of the digital age.

Kartika Paramita

Kartika Paramita is an Assistant Professor in International Business Law Program, Universitas Prasetiya Mulya, Indonesia. She is a member of the Indonesian Bar Association and graduated from the Master of Commercial Law Program of Erasmus University Rotterdam, the Netherlands with a specialization of Maritime and Transport Law. Her areas of interest include Investment Law, International Business Transaction, and International Trade and Shipping Law. She has been involved in some of Indonesian government's projects such as the study of warehousing and trucking system in supporting the effectiveness of the goods flow in Tanjung Priok Port, Jakarta.

Ulya Yasmine Prisandani

Ulya Yasmine Prisandani is an Assistant Professor of Law and a Faculty Member in the International Business Law Program of Universitas Prasetiya Mulya. She graduated from the Advanced Master of Laws Program in International Civil and Commercial Law of Leiden University, The Netherlands, and obtained her bachelor degree in law from Universitas Gadjah Mada, Indonesia. She is a member of the Indonesian Advocate Association and a licensed mediator in the Indonesian Mediation Center.

Poonam Puri

Appointed to Osgoode Hall Law School in 1997, Poonam Puri is one of Canada's leading experts in corporate governance, corporate law and securities law. She has served as both Associate Dean and Associate Dean, Research, Graduate Studies and Institutional Relations at Osgoode, and she has also chaired Osgoode's Faculty Council several times.

Professor Puri is Co-Founder and Director of the Osgoode Investor Protection Clinic, a clinic that provides pro bono legal assistance to individuals who have suffered financial harm. She is also Founder and Director of the Business Law LLM at Osgoode Professional Development.

A prolific scholar, Professor Puri has co-authored/co-edited close to 100 books, book chapters, scholarly articles in leading journals, and commissioned research reports. She has presented at over 200 invited keynotes, conferences and public addresses in Canada and around the world.

Professor Puri is a recipient of several prestigious fellowships, including a 2016 Trudeau Fellowship, and has received significant external research funding including five SSHRC grants. Her work is academically rigorous and firmly grounded in the realities of policy-making. Governments and regulators in Canada and internationally, including the Ministry of Finance, Treasury Board, Industry Canada, and the International Finance Corporation of the World Bank, have called upon her expertise for financial regulation that serves the public interest.

Professor Puri has been recognized for her impact and leadership both at Osgoode and beyond. While she is most proud of being a two time recipient of Osgoode's Teaching Excellence Awards, she has also been recognized as one of the top 25 most influential lawyers in Canada by Canadian Lawyer Magazine in 2017 and 2015. She is also a former recipient of Canada's Top 40 under 40TM award and Canada's Most Powerful Women: Top 100 Award.

Professor Puri currently serves on the boards of the Canada Infrastructure Bank, Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital and the Ontario Securities Commission. Previously having served on the boards of Women's College Hospital and the Greater Toronto Airport Authority (Pearson Airport), Professor Puri's public sector board work has provided her with valuable experience and skills in strategic planning, financial stewardship, operational oversight, labour relations and stakeholder engagement.

Karsten Engsig Sørensen

Karsten Engsig Sørensen is a professor of law working at the Department of Law, Aarhus University. He holds a Danish law degree, a PhD (on EU Company Law), and a Danish Dr. Jur. (on joint ventures). Much of his research has focused on the internal market and in particular different aspect of the harmonization of company law. He is one of the editors of the SSRN series Nordic & European Company Law and has published extensively in international law journals and he had co-edited a number of books most recently Abuse of Companies published on Kluwer Law International.

Giovanni Strampelli

Professor Giovanni Strampelli is Professor at Bocconi University, Milan. He teaches and writes in the areas of corporate law, accounting law, bankruptcy law and securities regulation. His scholarship has been or will be published in the Virginia Law & Business Review, the University of Illinois Journal of Law, Technology & Policy, the European Business Organization Law Review and the European Company Financial Law Review, as well as in Italian leading journals (e.g. Rivista delle Società, Banca Borsa e Titoli di Credito, Rivista di Diritto Civile). He is also author of two books. He is member of the Faculty of the Ph.D. in Legal Studies at Bocconi University of Milan. He was visiting scholar in many research institutes and University, such as the Max Planck Institute for Tax Law and Public Finance in Munich, the Max Planck Institute for Comparative and International Private Law in Hamburg, the University of Oxford. Some representative research projects include directors' independence in listed companies with controlling shareholders, corporate governance consequences of passive investing, high frequency trading and market abuse, interaction between international accounting standards (IAS/IFRS) and companies' capital, and the relevance of issuers' accounting disclosure for different investor groups.

Roman Tomasic

Professor Roman Tomasic is a Professor of Law in the School of Law, University of South Australia where his teaching and research focuses mainly on Australian and comparative corporate and commercial law. He has worked in Universities in Australia, the United Kingdom, the United States and Hong Kong and remains a Visiting Professor of Company Law at the Durham Law School in the UK. He is also an Emeritus Professor of the University of Canberra.

He holds Doctorates from the University of New South Wales (PhD) and the University of Wisconsin-Madison (SJD). He also holds undergraduate qualifications in Law from the University of Sydney and has been admitted as a Solicitor by the Supreme Court of New South Wales.

Professor Tomasic has been an active member of the Corporate Law Teachers Association since its inception and has served at its president. He has also served as the Chair of the Australasian Law Teachers Association; he is also a Member and Fellow of the Australian Academy of Law. He has undertaken consulting work in Australia and internationally; this has included international consultancies with the World Bank, the OECD and GTZ, as well as domestic consultancies with the Australian Law Reform Commission and the Legal and Constitutional Affairs Committee of the Australian Parliament.

He has extensive international teaching, research and consultancy experience in areas of commercial and corporate law, with a particular interest in comparative and international dimensions of law.

Professor Tomasic has successfully supervised PhD students in Australia and the United Kingdom. Many of these have been international students. He is especially interested in supervising students in areas such as (i) Comparative Corporate Governance; (ii) International and Comparative Insolvency Law and Financial Regulation; (iii) The Legal Control of Takeovers, Mergers and Corporate Reorganisations; (iv) Legal Aspects of the Global Financial Crisis. (v) The Legal Regulation of Securities Markets; (vi) Corporate Crime and Corporate Social Responsibility; (vi) The Global Financial Crisis and Banking Regulation; (vii) Corporate Law Theory, and related legal areas.

Vassilis Tountopoulos

Prof. Dr. Vassilios Tountopoulos. A graduate of the University of Athens School of Law, he pursued further studies in Göttingen, Germany, where he obtained a Ph.D. in company law. He is a full professor at the University of the Aegean and a member of the scientific committee of various legal journals. Vassilios Tountopoulos is an active lawyer at the Greek Supreme Court. He has previously served as a general legal counsel at the Hellenic Post and as member of various expert groups. He has also served as non-executive Member of the BoD of various companies.

Robert Chang-hsien Tsai

Chang-hsien (Robert) TSAI is a Professor of Law and Business at the Institute of Law for Science and Technology, College of Technology Management, National Tsing Hua University in Taiwan, where he teaches Corporate Law, Commercial Law, Business Associations, Securities Regulation, Introduction to Civil & Commercial Law, Seminar on Business Association and Financial Law, Capital Market Regulations and Corporate Governance, Seminar on FinTech Regulation & Legal Policy, and Economic Analysis of Law. He was admitted to the New York and Taiwan bars, and practiced law for several years in Taiwan before relocating to the United States to pursue graduate study in law.

Prof. TSAI graduated from the National Taiwan University College of Law with an LL.B. degree and a Master of Law degree. Additionally, he completed an LL.M. degree in Corporate Law from New York University and a J.S.D. from the University of Illinois (UIUC). During his time at NYU and UIUC, he worked with the late Professor Larry E. Ribstein, who was ranked in the top four of corporate law professors in scholarly impact and whose research was the fourteenth-most downloaded of law professors in the world on SSRN.

Prof. TSAI specializes in corporate law, financial market regulations, and securities regulation. Using analytic tools from the fields of law and economics, he examines the interaction of public regulation (governments or law) and private regulation/governance (the market and firms). His current research topics can be grouped into two broader tracks: comparative corporate law (including corporate governance and corporate social responsibility) and comparative financial regulation, including consumer financial protection and regulation of emerging financial technology (such as crowdfunding, online supply-chain financing and online peer-to-peer lending). In addition to the appointment as Visiting Associate Professor of Law at the School of Law Tohoku University in Japan, he was invited to be principal speakers or to deliver public lectures for other leading research institutions, such as KoGuan Law School Shanghai Jiao Tong University; the Faculty of Law of the Chinese University of Hong Kong; the Faculty of Law of Sophia University, Tokyo, Japan; the Faculty of Law of Doshisha University, Kyoto, Japan; and the SungKyunKwan University Law School, Seoul, Korea. His articles in English have appeared in journals such as the *Hong Kong Law Journal*, the *Boston University International Law Journal*, the *Syracuse Journal of International Law and Commerce*, the *Asian Journal of Law and Economics*, the *Asian Journal of Law and Society*, and the *Northwestern Journal of International Law & Business*.

Wai Yee Wan

Wai Yee WAN is Associate Dean (Research and Internationalisation) and Professor, School of Law, City University of Hong Kong. Prior to joining City University of Hong Kong in January 2020, she was at Singapore Management University (SMU), where she last held the positions of Dean of Post-graduate Research Programmes and Professor of Law.

Immediately prior to joining academia in late 2005, she was a partner at Allen & Gledhill in Singapore, where she practised in mergers and acquisitions and equity capital markets. Her main areas of research are in corporate law, mergers and acquisitions, securities regulation, financial consumer regulation and global restructuring and insolvency. Her research work centres on the optimal legal institutions and governance framework in order for securities markets to flourish. She has a particular interest in Asian securities markets and why the solutions to corporate governance issues, securities market integration and reorganisation of distressed companies in the West (the United Kingdom (UK) and the United States (US)) may not be ideal as a basis of global best practice or may not work as intended in Asia.

Her publications have appeared (or have been accepted) in books and in international peer-reviewed legal journals, including American Journal of Comparative Law, Journal of Empirical Legal Studies, European Business Organisations Law Review, Journal of Corporate Law Studies, Journal of Business Law, Company and Securities Law Journal and Lloyds' Maritime and Commercial Law Quarterly. While at SMU, she has received external research grants and research awards and fellowships, including the Ministry of Education Tier 2 research grant, the Singapore Judicial College grant, Lee Kuan Yew Fellowship for Research Excellence (the highest honour given for research excellence in SMU), the Lee Kong Chian Fellowship, Hauser Global Research Fellowship by NYU, and the Lee Foundation Fellowship for Research Excellence. Her research findings have been relied on in consultation papers involving law and regulatory reforms locally and internationally. She is on the editorial boards of Australian Journal of Corporate Law and Company Lawyer and she has served on national committees relating to law reform and policy in Singapore.

Chao Xi

Chao XI is Professor and Vice Chancellor's Outstanding Fellow of the Faculty of Law at The Chinese University of Hong Kong, where he concurrently serves as Associate Dean (Research) and Head of Graduate Division of Law. He also directs the Chinese Law Program of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, CUHK.

Professor Xi specialises in comparative corporate law, securities regulation, and financial regulation, with a particular focus on the case of China. He has published extensively in leading peer-reviewed international journals, including the *Banking and Finance Law Review*, *European Business Organization Law Review*, *Journal of Business Law*, and *Journal of Comparative Law*, *Statute Law Review*, and *Tort Law Review*. His research has received significant funding support from the Hong Kong SAR Government Research Grants Council, the PRC Ministry of Education, the Government of India, and the Sumitomo Foundation. He has been appointed by the Policy Innovation and Co-ordination Office (PICO) of the Hong Kong SAR Government to serve on the Assessment Panel of its Public Policy Research (PPR) and Strategic Public Policy Research (SPPR) Funding Schemes.

Professor Xi holds visiting positions at various leading overseas institutions. He serves on the Editorial Board of a number of international peer-reviewed journals, including *The China Review* (SSCI-indexed), the *Hong Kong Law* (SSCI-indexed), and the *Journal of Banking and Finance Law and Practice*.
